Now with 3,000 square feet of space, Gélinas expanded her selection of high-end clothing and accessories for women 30 and up. On the racks, you'll find European labels like Marc Cain, with quilted jackets from Luisa Cerano, floral peplum tops from Airfield and fall booties from Swims on the shelves below.

Aside from more inventory and spacious changing rooms, there is room for a small coffee bar, where an espresso or apéritif may be sipped between fittings. Every few weeks on a Thursday evening, 5e offers "5av-7" soirées with music, drinks and hors d'oeuvres.

"I wanted a place where shopping was a complete experience, where people would feel at home in the store. ... That's how 5e Avenue was born."

In 25 years, she has seen changes in the way that women shop. "Women have less time, they travel more and more, they're more active and they dress with more contemporary style. Twenty-five years ago, a woman might have let her age determine her look, but now she just wants to be modern."
